The Scoop

What is Bridging the Gap?

Bridging the Gap is a temporary contact program for individuals getting out of treatment or other facilities. A separate program, "Contact upon release" has been created for those leaving correctional facilities.

The concept behind "Bridging the Gap" (BTG) is as old as Alcoholics Anonymous itself — one drunk talking to another, each reinforcing the other's understanding that they can find a way to face life sober, and build meaningful relationships without alcohol. In order to bridge the gap, A.A. members have volunteered to be temporary contacts and introduce newcomers to Alcoholics Anonymous. How Does Bridging the Gap Work?

Bridging the Gap can provide a temporary contact for alcoholics in treatment centers, medical facilities, crisis centers, detox centers or other facilities. The intent of Bridging the Gap is to provide the recently released or discharged alcoholic with temporary help for a limited time. Keep in mind that this is basic Twelfth Step work.

Experience suggests that it is best for a BTG contact to be accompanied by another A.A. member when meeting the newcomer.

Experience also suggests that temporary contact and newcomers be matched by gender, and if possible, by age. Concerns about safety are of particular importance to A.A. members. When safety concerns arise, local or area committees at the district, area, intergroup or central office should be consulted. Of course, in an emergency please contact 911.

In some parts of the U.S. and Canada, BTG operates as a stand-alone committee, while in others Bridging the Gap is part of the work of a Treatment or Hospitals and Institutions (H&I) committee. In still others, the work is organized by a local intergroup committees or central offices. Regardless of how it is organized, all share the basic goal of providing a bridge that helps newcomers find Alcoholics Anonymous.

Step 10

"Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

As we work the first nine Steps, we prepare ourselves for the adventure of a new life. But when we approach Step Ten we commence to put our A.A. way of living to practical use, day by day, in fair weather or foul. Then comes the acid test: Can we stay sober, keep in emotional balance, and live to good purpose under all conditions?

A continuous look at our assets and liabilities, and a real desire to learn and grow by this means, are necessities for us. We alcoholics have learned this the hard way. More experienced people, of course, in all times and places have practiced unsparing self-survey and criticism. For the wise have always known that no one can make much of his life until self-searching becomes a regular habit, until he is able to admit and accept what he finds, and until he patiently and persistently tried to correct what is wrong.

When a drunk has a terrible hangover because he drank heavily yesterday, he cannot live well today. But there is another kind of hangover which we all experience whether we are drinking or not. That is the emotional hangover, the direct result of yesterday's and sometimes today's excesses of negative emotion- anger, jealousy, and the like. If we would live serenely today and tomorrow, we certainly need to eliminate these hangovers. This doesn't mean we need to wander morbidly around in the past. It requires the admission and correction of errors now. Our inventory enables us to settle with the past. When this is done, we are really able to leave it behind us. When our inventory is carefully taken, and we have made peace with ourselves, the conviction follows that tomorrow's challenges can be met as they come.

Although all inventories are alike in principle, the time factor does distinguish one from another. There's the spot check inventory, taken at any time of the day, whenever we find ourselves getting tangled up. There's the one we take at day's end, when we review the happenings of the ourselves with things well done, and chalking up debits in the company of our sponsor or spiritual advisor, we make A.A.'s go in for annual or semiannual housecleanings. Many of us also like the experience of an occasional retreat from the outside world where we can quiet down for an

undisturbed day or so of selfoverhaul and meditation.

The 10th Tradition

"Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy."

Never since it began has Alcoholics Anonymous been divided by a major controversial issue. Nor has our Fellowship ever publicly taken sides on any question in an embattled world. This, however, has been no earned virtue. It could almost be said that we were born with it, for, as one oldtimer recently declared, "Practically never have I heard a heated religious, political, or reform argument among A.A. members. So long as we don't argue these matters privately, it's a cinch we never shall publicly."

As by some deep instinct, we A.A's have known from the very beginning that we must never, no matter what the provocation, publicly take sides in any fight, even a worthy one. All history affords us the spectacle of striving nations and groups finally torn asunder because they were designed for, or tempted into, controversy. Others fell apart because of sheer self-righteousness while trying to enforce upon the rest of mankind some millennium of their own specification. In our own times, we have seen millions die in political and economic wars often spurred by religious and racial difference. We live in the

imminent possibility of a fresh holocaust to determine how men shall be governed, and how the products of nature and toil shall be divided among them. That is the spiritual climate in which A.A. was born and by God's grace has nevertheless flourished.

Tenth Concept:

Concept 10 – Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority – the scope of such authority to be always well defined whether by tradition, by resolution, by specific job description or by appropriate charters and bylaws.

Our service structure cannot

function effectively and harmoniously unless, at every level, each operational responsibility is matched by a corresponding authority to discharge it. This requires that authority must be delegated at every level – and that the responsibility and authority of every entity are well defined and clearly understood. Let's begin with the group. Concept I states the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" resides with the A.A. groups, and they delegate this authority to the Conference (Concept II). The detail of which topics for discussion or items of concern are forwarded to the Conference by the Groups via the GSR which were discussed at our District meetings and at our Area Assemblies.

The Conference, in turn, *delegates* to the General Service Board the authority to manage A.A.'s affairs (Concept III) in its behalf. The detail of what topics and /or items are forwarded by the Conference to the General Service Board are reported to the Fellowship via a printed Final Report distributed to the Fellowship following the annual meeting of the General Service Conference.

The General Service Board is in authority over its subsidiary operating conditions – A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine Inc. The General Service

Boards *delegates* to the directors of those corporations the authority necessary to run these service entities.

The directors of AAWS and the AA Grapevine are in authority over the executives of these corporations, but delegate to these officers the authority needed to carry out their administrative responsibilities. And lastly, the executives of AAWS and the AA Grapevine delegate to the General Service Office and Grapevine staff members and other employees the authority necessary to carry out their important service jobs. The benefit to the Fellowship of this *delegation* of responsibility and authority is immense.
